In the collection "The Birth of a Poet," published after the death of Abdulla Oripov, there is a poem "Under the Willow," where innocent childhood days were spent playing under this tree, and the willow said "summer, summer." the encouragement he gave, the one who encouraged him to pick up a pen for the first time is the root of that willow, and the one who made him an admirer of poetry is also the root of that willow.

influenced his poetic thinking and creative development. Abdulla Oripov recalls his childhood impressions this way: "One of our neighbors was a very pure man named Kamolkhan Eshon. The mother of gratitude was called Bibi Momo. I don't know, maybe they descended from the Cattacogan Yaks, Momo Bibi was an extremely literate grandmother. I followed my mother and took part in their conversation. Bibi Momo had a book the size of a sandal. The book was called "Navoi-kitob". Aunt Bibi recited Farhad-u Shirin and Leili-yu Majnun so well that even if I did not understand most of their meaning, I enjoyed reading it. Abdulla Oripov's poems show boundless love for the Karshi oasis and the people who live there. Although the bulk of his life and work took place in Tashkent, Karshi was the place where his umbilical cord blood was shed for the rest of his life and happy days. his childhood was spent in Karshi, it is especially noted that he lived in an oasis, in support of our opinion we cite the following poem:

My happy childhood is still before my eyes,

The air of the mountain, which inspired me again,

The sound of a flute at the end of the ravines,

I am your son, native village.

In the formation and development of any poet, the environment in which he was born and raised is important. In the collection of poems "The Birth of a Poet," published after the death of Abdulla Oripov, he enthusiastically recalls his childhood impressions and moments when he was fascinated by the beauty of Mother Nature, and captures them in poetic verses.
